Second John - Love and Truth Author - John

- Author see the last Bible snapshot about First John. Same author.
- John writes this second epistle to warn against the corrupting influences of false teachers denying the reality of Christ's humanity and to encourage Christians to "love in the truth."
- The apostle John exhorts and encourages the lady to whom he writes to continue in the truth and faith of the gospel in love to God and His people, and to avoid false teachers and their doctrines. With regard to this, his primary message is that the truth is Christ and found only in Him.
- This is a personal letter written to the "elect lady," which may be a particular congregation, though little is know about the original recipients.
- Second John has only 1 chapter, 13 verses and only 303 words.
